Southern Baptist student ministry celebrates diamond anniversary By Chip Alford, posted August 15, 1997

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (BP)—In a small office overlooking the Mississippi River in Memphis, Tenn., something started 75 years ago that has resulted in hundreds of thousands of decisions for Christ, at least that many young people becoming involved in career or short-term missions projects and millions of dollars being raised for international and North American missions.

That "something" was Southern Baptist work among college students, a ministry the late Frank Leavell launched with two desks, a typewriter, a stenographer and a dream.

The dream got a name two years later when Baptist college students agreed on the title "Baptist Student Union" for their on-campus organizations. What began as a presence on a dozen campuses in the South grew into a ministry that has touched all 50 states and dozens of countries around the world.

"Most Southern Baptists don't realize they have the largest collegiate ministry in the nation," Henry said, adding the program is bigger than Campus Crusade, Navigators and InterVarsity combined. Last year alone, more than 237,000 students on nearly 1,000 campuses were reached through SBC student ministry.

"But it's not the size of our ministry that excites me," Henry said. "I'm proud of the difference that is being made in the lives of college students. Thousands are finding Christ, growing in their faith and acting on it in their everyday lives. This is an incredibly important investment for Southern Baptists."

Henry said SBC student work in 1996 resulted in 5,500 professions of faith. In addition, students gave \$3.2 million to support missions, sent out 27,000 student missionaries and helped start 362 new churches or missions.

From Then to More Recent ~ The Drastic Decline

One of the last movements of God in the United States began among students in the late '60s and early '70s," said NAMB Senior Vice President of Evangelism and Leadership Johnny Hunt about a period commonly referred to as the Jesus Movement. "In recent years we, as Southern Baptists, have seen a great loss in reaching students," Hunt said. Current trends among students in SBC churches are discouraging. Last year, Southern Baptists baptized 38% fewer teenagers than they did in 2000.

"When I talk about the great need of focusing on reaching, baptizing and discipling teenagers in our churches, people understand this great need," EC President Ronnie Floyd said. "When they hear that our churches are baptizing fewer teenagers than in the year 2000, they begin to see this great need, and God begins to burden their hearts about their churches."

A similar downward trend of Christianity in younger generations is taking place outside of the Southern Baptist Convention as well. Recent research has made an abundantly clear point: successive generations are less likely to attend church than their parents were. A 2018 Barna study found that 42% of the Gen Z generation (those born between 1999 and 2015) say they identify with a faith besides Christianity or have no faith at all. "In the face of these realities, we can't continue to wait and wish that the downward trend in student evangelism will change," Pruitt said. "The harvest is plentiful, and now is the time to reach students with the hope of Jesus." From middle schoolers to college scholars, students are not the missionaries of tomorrow—they are the missionaries of today.

From the Pastor's Desk



In June I spent a day hiking in the Shenandoah

Valley of Virginia. The clerk at the hotel noticed my hiking boots, my hat, my clothes and said, "You look like you're going for a walk, It's a good day for it." The next morning when I checked out, the same clerk was at the desk. "How was your walk yesterday?" I answered without mentioning my blistered feet, sore knees and ankles, aching muscles, and sun burned face, and arms, "It was very nice."

So, let me ask you, "This summer how was your walk?"

Dallas Willard, a professor of New Testament studies wrote, "The gospel is less about how to get into the Kingdom of Heaven after you die, and more about how to live in the Kingdom of Heaven before you die."

The Bible speaks often of our lives now here on earth as a walk. For instance, Romans 13:13 - Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying. And, Galatians 5:16 - This I say then, walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh.

In the Bible the focus is less on what happens when we die. The focus is more concerned about the "Kingdom of God." The believers of the first

century considered God's kingdom to be a present reality, but that the final fulfillment of this Kingdom was still in the future. It won't be completed until the day when there is a restoration of the whole of creation, when Jesus comes again. They believed God's kingdom had been launched through the events of Jesus' life and was infiltrating the world right then. Salvation was not a "one and done" thing, but a continual process in their lives. This is why it is so important that once you begin the Christian walk you continue in it. This is why we seek God's guidance on a daily basis. This is why we can take confidence, like the Philippians in chapter 1 when Paul says, "He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus." The work is happening right now if you are committed. We are on the road to complete salvation, but have not yet arrived. These may be new ideas for some of us, but I believe that's what it means to be a Jesus follower, one who seeks the Kingdom of God. Yes, getting saved is the first step of our hike of faith, and the first step is very important. But a step is not a hike.

Imagine if God asked you when you entered your heavenly rest, "How was your walk?" I hope you will be able to say as John Sammis wrote in his great hymn, "When we walk with the Lord, in the light of His word, what a glory He sheds on our way."
