From the Pastor's Desk



A few weeks ago, I got together with another pastor in Jacksonville. We are friends and we were meeting for lunch. I had arrived at the church office in Jacksonville early and I went in and sat with him and his son who was nine years old. We talked for a while, then he turned off the lights, set the alarm and locked the church door. We walked to our cars, I went to mine, he and his boy went to his. There was a man who was walking across the church parking lot toward us as we got to our cars.

He went up to the other pastor's car, and I heard a voice say, "Excuse me, I know you are trying to leave, but is there any way I could get one of those bags you give to people in need." I turned around and saw my friend had opened his car door and had one foot inside the car, about to sit down. He pauses, takes a deep breath, and then smiles at the stranger. He said, "Wait right here and I will see what I can find." He tossed the car keys to his son and he headed back into the church. I stayed with his son and the needy man while he ran back inside to look for something to give the man. I watched his son, seemingly unphased by his dad running back in, play with water from the fresh rain that had pooled up on the parking lot. I talked to the man about where he was living and where he was from, I asked, "Are you a believer in the Lord?" He answered, "Yes sir." A few thoughts crossed my mind at that moment.

First, I thought, "What a good pastor." Then I thought, "If I said that to him, he would just say that he is not good and that helping one struggling man pales in comparison to what Christ did." Second, I thought, "How cool is it that his son is so used to seeing this that he is unphased." It reminded me of all the times I watched my father help people that could never repay him. I was unphased too and would not realize the magnitude of that example until much later in life.

The third thought that ran through my mind was, "What if he didn't stop and help." He was busy, and if like me, hungry, and was keeping us waiting. It was not an urgent situation. No one would have blamed him if he had said "I have already locked the church. I am on my way to lunch. Can you come back in two hours?" Personally, I think it would have been completely acceptable, but he did not take the easy road. He did not say we have a committee for that. He simply met the need. No credit. No audience. No reward. Just acting like Jesus. The passage that came to mind later that night was Matthew 25:35-36. "For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes, and you clothed me, I was sick, and you looked after me, I was in prison, and you came to visit me." He returned after about 5 minutes, with not a sack but a box filled with groceries, and he gave it to the man in the parking lot. That man smiled with relief and said, "God bless you pastor."

I hoped that I would have done the same. A few days ago, in another parking lot at a Taco Bell, I had the chance to, as a man walked up to me as I got out of my car and asked me for money, so he could get something to eat and something to drink. He said he was from Conway and forgot to bring his money with him to work. I only had a few dollars, but I gave them all to him. You see, I believe we can have all the knowledge in the world, we can have every argument for Christianity memorized, but the best apologetic you can ever give is the way you live your life.


SUNDAY NIGHT BIBLE STUDY

A Word from Jeremy

All too often, those of us who have been in a relationship with Christ for a number of years, may feel as if we know all of the Savior we should or will ever know. We may deny that, if asked. But the lives we lead betray us. We come to church and surround ourselves with church folk and church activities and are generally adept at convincing ourselves, at least, that we are doing the best anyone could and know all there is to know about the Word of God. None of us has yet arrived; and, there is always more to be learned as we sit at the feet of Jesus. Each of us should have an account of the goodness of God and a tale of how He disciplines and teaches us more and more as we humbly seek Him and His righteousness year after year. Instead, it seems that many in the church are content to berate and correct one another in contentiousness and out of self-love and a sense of self-importance rather than in a spirit of love for their brothers and sisters...or for the lost. The sideways glance or off hand comment on the way someone is dressed, or their tattoos, or even the unnatural color of their hair these days, is enough to send some who are seeking Christ and even those who are young in their faith out of the doors of the church building never to return.

Errantly, our focus is often on the trivial. All the while, the souls of people are at stake. We must remember the exhortation given in Romans 12:3 not to think of ourselves more highly than we ought. We should also remember the instruction given to the Corinthian church in 1 Corinthians 5:13 that reminds us it is the duty of God to judge those who are not of the household of faith. While the same verse says we are to purge the evil person from among us in the church, earlier in the same chapter we are told it is done so that the man's spirit may be saved on the day of the Lord. Our intentions and attitudes matter when it comes to how we walk as believers in this world. It is important that we keep this in the forefront of our minds as we seek to know God and make Him known.
