What Does Jesus Want This Christmas?

Reading God's Prayers

What does Jesus want this Christmas? We can see the answer in his prayers. What does he ask God for? His longest prayer is <u>John 17</u>. The climax of his desire is in verse 24.

Among all the undeserving sinners in the world, there are those whom God has "given" to Jesus. These are those whom God has drawn to the Son (<u>John 6:44, 65</u>). These are *Christians*—people who have *received* Jesus as the crucified and risen Savior and Lord and Treasure of their lives (<u>John 1:12; 3:17; 6:35; 10:11, 17–18; 20:28</u>). Jesus says he wants them to be with him.

Sometimes we hear people say that God created man because he was lonely. So they say, "God created us so that we would be *with him.*" Does Jesus agree with this? Well, he *does* say that he really wants us to be with him! Yes, but why? Consider the rest of the verse. Why does Jesus want us to be with him?

. . to see my glory that you [Father] have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.

That would be a strange way of expressing his loneliness. "I want them with me so they can see my glory." In fact, it doesn't express his loneliness. It expresses his concern for the satisfaction of *our* longing, not *his* loneliness. Jesus is not lonely. He and the Father and the Spirit are profoundly satisfied in the fellowship of the Trinity. We, not he, are starving for something. And what Jesus wants for Christmas is for us to experience what we were really made for—seeing and savoring his glory. Oh, that God would make this sink in to our souls! Jesus made us (John 1:3) to see his glory.

Just before he goes to the cross, Jesus pleads his deepest desires with the Father: "Father, I desire [I desire] that they . . . may be with me where I am, to see my glory." But that is only half of what Jesus wants in these final, climactic verses of his prayer. I just said we were really made for seeing and savoring his glory. Is that what he wants—that we not only see his glory but savor it, relish it, delight in it, treasure it, love it? Consider verse 26, the very last verse:

I made known to them your name, and I will continue to make it known, that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them. Jesus's longing and goal is that we see his glory, and then that we be able to love what we see with the same love that the Father has for the Son.

That is the end of the prayer. What is Jesus's *final* goal for us? Not that we simply see his glory, but that we love him with the same love that the Father has for him: "that the love with which you [Father] have loved me may be in them."

Jesus's longing and goal is that we see his glory, and then that we be able to love what we see with the same love that the Father has for the Son. And he doesn't mean that we merely *imitate* the love of the Father for the Son. He means the Father's very love becomes our love for the Son—that we love the Son with the love of the Father for the Son. This is what the Spirit becomes and bestows in our lives: love for the Son by the Father through the Spirit.

What Jesus wants most for Christmas is that his elect be gathered in and then get what *they* want most—to *see* his glory and then *savor* it with the very savoring of the Father for the Son.

What I want most for Christmas this year is to join you (and many others) in seeing Christ in all his fullness, and that we together be able to love what we see with a love far beyond our own half-hearted human capacities.

This is our goal in these Advent devotionals. We want together to see and savor this Jesus whose first advent (coming) we celebrate, and whose second advent we anticipate. This is what Jesus prays for us this Christmas: "Father,

show them my glory and give them the very delight in me that you have in me." Oh, may we *see* Christ with the eyes of God and *savor* Christ with the heart of God. That is the essence of heaven. That is the gift Christ came to purchase for sinners at the cost of his death in our place.

So, I would like to share an editorial from an old newspaper. This is from the Advertiser Neosho, Missouri, December 13, 1989.

ONE SOLITARY LIFE (author unknown)

Here is a man who was born of Jewish parents in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another obscure village. He worked in a carpenter's shop until He was thirty, and then for three years He was an itinerant preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never had a family. He never went to college. He never put His foot inside a big city. He never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but Himself.


He had nothing to do with this world except the naked power of His divine humanity. While He was still a

young man, the tide of public opinion turned against Him. His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. One betrayed Him and turned Him over to His enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth while He was dying- and that was His coat. When He was dead, He was taken down, and laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

Nineteen centuries have come and gone and today He is the Centerpiece of the human race and the leader of the column of progress. I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that were ever built, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of a man upon this earth as powerfully as has that One Solitary Life.

IMB | Lottie Moon Christmas Offering & Week of Prayer for International Missions December 3-10, 2023



This year, the national Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal is \$200 million and out of that, the Zion Hill goal is \$10,000. Last year's offering totaled \$194,314,716 (as of Sept. 28), surpassing the \$190 million goal for the 2022-2023 Lottie season. Goals like these are only reached through cooperation of Southern Baptists by prayer and faithful giving. While the offering is named after the Christmas season, people can give throughout the year. Did you know that 59% of the world today is considered unreached—meaning Jesus is largely unknown among 4.5 billion people? 100% of gifts to the Lottie Moon Offering supports missionary presence and enables gospel transformation among the unreached. Over 90% of the IMB teams actively engage at least one unreached people group. During this year's SBC annual meeting, IMB President Paul Chitwood emphasized the importance of working together. "Your IMB missionaries are addressing the world's greatest problem with the only solution, God's solution — the Gospel. But they need your prayers, your support, your continued generosity and more workers in the harvest," he said. Because of their steadfast presence among the nations, 3,521 missionaries and 95 Global Missionary Partners were able to engage 67 new people groups and places and see 178,177 people come to Christ last year. "This can only happen if we work together to raise up more missionaries and champion the Lottie Moon offering and the Cooperative Program." Prayer guides and offering envelopes will be included in your bulletins.
